

R-BLENDS @ HOME

R-blends are created by combining a consonant + the /r/sound. Here are some examples of r-blends:

br: brown, brush, bread

pr: prize, pretty, princess

fr: frog, frown, free

tr: train, tree, try

dr: drive, drop, drink

gr: green, great, grape

cr: crown, cry, crayon

Your child may be working on one or more r-blends at a time. Check with your child's SLP to see which ones you should start with.

Some r-blends develop before others. Children usually learn to say r-blends correctly between ages 5 and 7.

Your child may learn to say some r-blends before they can say the /r/ sound on its own.

How do you make it?

The first step in helping your child develop r-blends is by providing lots of chances for them to hear the sound. The more you use it, the more you are helping your child learn!

The /r/ sound can be made 2 different ways:

- Pulling the tongue back into a 'bunched' position
- Flipping the tip of the tongue back into a 'retroflex' position

It is important when practicing /r/ blends not to add an extra vowel sound in between the first consonant and the /r/





Daily Practice Ideas

Day 1: Read or listen to a book like this one:

"Green Eggs and Ham"

Day 2: Sing a song together, like this one:

<u>"Five Green and Speckled Frogs"</u>

Day 3: Go on a treasure hunt around the house.

Look for: grapes, broccoli, dress, truck, drum, crayons princess, brush and more!

Day 4: Play I spy with my little eye:

I spy something..

brown/green/grey

Day 5: Fun with Foods!

Taste something that is...

frozen, green, gross, dry fried, brittle, fresh...



How can you help?

- Get face to face with your child when playing so they can hear and see what your mouth is doing.
- Use the sound in daily routines. For example, "Elsa is a princess! Princess starts with our special sound."
- When your child says an r-blend word incorrectly, say it back to them and emphasize
 the correct pronunciation (e.g., Child: "That baby is cwying" Parent: "You're right he is
 crrrying. I wonder what made him crrry.")

More fun activity ideas...

- Find pictures of simple words that start with <u>r-blends</u>. You can practice by:
 - Mixing them with pictures of words that do NOT start with an r-blend. Hide both sets of pictures around the house. Each time your child finds a picture they must be a 'sound detective' and decide if it starts with their special sound or not.
 - Using 2 copies of each picture and playing a memory game
 - Choosing a 'secret' picture your child has to guess which one you are thinking of (then they get to choose a picture and you guess!)
- Playing "What Sound is it Mr. Wolf"
 - Instead of asking 'What time is it Mr. Wolf?' the children ask
 'What sound is it Mr. Wolf?'. If the wolf says a word that starts with their special sound, the child takes a step forward.
