Ideas to support use of language...

- ☑ Use social phrases like "my turn/your turn", "Do you want to play with me?", "thank you", "please", "that's ok"
- ☑ Use descriptive words like "first", "many", "ahead", "back"
- ☑ Use action words like "wait", "match", "count", "give" and "take"
- ☑ Once you are done playing, talk about what you did using past tense to someone who wasn't there over video chat. (e.g. We played a game today. I was the red piece. I went all around the board and then I finished. We had fun!)



Ideas to support understanding of language...

- Ask your child **who** questions like "who's turn is it next?" "who is going to choose the game for today?" "who is having fun?"
- ☑ Have your child follow a short simple sequence as you work together (e.g. "first we open the box, next we take the pieces out, then we play the game and last we clean up").



Ideas to support speech sounds...

Emphasize this sound in your words as you play together. If your child can, have them try to say them too!

Practice "f" sounds: first, four, five, fast, faster, fastest, finally, fix, far, fun, found, find, off, after, laugh
